Welcome to this month's Bulletin.

The month of February has seen all restrictions with regard to the covid pandemic being fully lifted in the UK, a real relief to everyone.

Unfortunately, some international bonsai events will still be operating under local restrictions therefore the scheduled World Bonsai Convention being held in Australia is now being held on a virtual online basis. With regard to this event we would like to congratulate Will Baddeley of the UK on providing one of the demonstrations at this the most prestigious of all bonsai events held every four years.

The saying from the TV series Black Adder: "The path of my life is strewn with cow pats from the devils own satanic herd" might describe the current situation, moving from the pandemic to a war now in Europe, who knows what's around the corner. My wife and I regularly visit Taiwan, her family home, we have built up relationships with many of the bonsai community there visiting the yearly held Fwa Fong National show regularly. The complicated situation now developing in Europe unfortunately could possibly be repeated in the Far East with China taking the opportunity to do the same thing and try to take back Taiwan. For those of us lucky enough to visit the Far East, the home of bonsai or Penjing as the Chinese call it, things may become very difficult in that region in the near future. So, I think that the conclusion one might make is that the recent hiking up of prices on imported materials from abroad is here to stay for some while. Even pots made here in the UK are likely to be more expensive with energy costs going through the roof and materials more expensive. If you have any spare trees, pots or tools don't hide them away, get them back out there in circulation, sell or swap them on.

If that wasn't enough we at home here in the UK have experienced some of the windiest weather conditions for many years. Areas in the north experienced inclement weather conditions, something many of them would tell you they are prepared for, but those of us in the south not so familiar with these extremes and therefore not prepared, found bonsai benches up-turned and pots smashed. Perhaps many of us will be paying much more attention to how we store our favourite trees over future winter periods.

As most of you are aware we have introduced a new section on the website called interviews, these will be published as and when in the bulletin. We are aiming this to start with at those within the UK bonsai community who

have been enthusiasts for twenty years or more. Please don't wait to be asked, if you feel capable of a said interview please let us know and start putting words to paper. Thank you.

Monthly Tasks

Below is a list of bonsai tasks to be carried out during the month of March, it must be adapted to your localised conditions and is meant only as a general advisory list of tasks for the bonsai enthusiast.

Bonsai in March

Hopefully all your bonsai trees were protected over the winter and you are starting to look forward to the onset of Spring in the UK so here is a quick generic guide to bonsai in March.

Watering:

Continue to check your trees daily and water as required. Watch for buds swelling and ensure to keep trees topped up with water during this period especially for flowering trees which are coming into bloom. Water in the mornings ideally to avoid the colder temperatures at night. Spray any repotted trees to ensure they do not dry out.

Re-potting:

You should now be in full swing of your re-potting as the onset of Spring is now upon us. So, with your soils sifted, pots selected and wire to the ready let re-potting commence in full if you haven't started already.

During repotting smell the soil that the tree comes out of, check roots for dead sections and rot ie look for black roots and remove any dead roots. Check also for pests in the soil and roots and remove or treat any pest problems like vine weevil larvae and mites. Prune roots dependent on the stage of root development and ensure the correct pot size if changing the pot.

Ensure that the soil mix is suitable for the tree species and that you use a range of techniques that are suitable for the tree species, stage of root development and health of the tree.

For any trees that you are not repotting still remove the top surface and re-top dress to remove any crusting on the surface to improve airflow and drainage down through the soil. Plus clean the pots of the trees if they have got green algae forming on them.

Feeding:

For broadleaved trees, feeding should not be necessary yet as the leaves are still not out and do not feed until at least 6-8 weeks after repotting for all trees that have been newly repotted.

Tropical trees and Evergreens can continue to be fed with a low nitrogen feed to maintain health and vigour at the onset of spring.

Pruning:

Species to avoid pruning in Spring due to potential for sap bleeding would be Acer, Betula, Carpinus, Carya, Juglans, Magnolia, Morus, Populus and Tilia.

If you haven't carried out your winter re-structure pruning if the buds have not started to fully swell then it would be alright to carry out any branch removals to address defects but ensure to cover with wound paste.

Remove and thin out unwanted buds or buds facing the wrong direction but do not over trim or prune at this stage.

Trimming:

Until the leaves appear trimming will not be required on broadleaved trees but continue to prune tropical trees to maintain their shape. Where too much growth is expected and buds are well advanced, removal of unwanted future twigs may be anticipated by pinching out buds now. Where density is required of foliage, pinch or remove the terminal bud to promote side buds to develop. This is also a good opportunity to check buds to see if they are viable.

Root pruning:

Species to avoid severe root pruning in Spring due to potential for sap bleeding would be Acer, Betula, Carpinus, Carya, Juglans, Magnolia, Morus, Populus and Tilia.

Insects and pests:

Hopefully following winter treatments the pest and insects should not be a concern in March but check for scale, mealybug and red spider mite just in case on overwintering twigs in old bark wounds and treat as necessary.

Moss and weed control:

Continue to keep this in check and treat or remove unwanted moss and remove any newly forming weeds.

Wiring:

Check wires and guys to ensure they are not cutting in and this is a good time to straighten out dis-used wire, which can be re-used for training wire.

Protection:

Continue to protect from late frosts as it is still not very warm outside and ensure to harden off leaves before moving your trees out from a cold greenhouse.

Assessment:

Continue to update your bonsai records and photograph your trees to record their progress.

Collection:

This is a good time to still collect trees from the wild (subject to permission) as broadleaved trees are still dormant generally and lifting trees can usually be carried out from October through to the end of April subject to avoiding frosts or frozen ground. The very best time to lift trees is when the trees energy has moved from the root system up into the branch structure just prior to the buds opening out into leaf.

Tools:

This is something everyone should do each time they use their tools but often it is not easy to do depending on how often you are using your tools. However, it is good practice to clean and sharpen your tools after use and this is a good time to go through your tool kits and clean them up before the start of the pruning season.

Display areas:

Subject to how you display your trees, if you are looking to bring your trees out later in Spring from their winter protection it is an ideal time to clean off your display areas or benches and disinfect them as well as re-treat with a wood preservative or relevant treatment for the material so they show your trees off once they are ready to come out.

Propagation:

Sow any seeds this month like Dwarf Quince, Cedar, Pine, Punica, Cypress, Sophora. Take softwood cuttings when buds are well on the move.

How did I Get started

Firstly, I would like to thank Mark and Ming for giving me the opportunity to remind me of my journey through the past years of being involved with some of the most artistic (in any art form) who are able to create a replica of the tree species they may be working on - a living creation called a Bonsai. I had been practising Judo for twenty years and running a club with all that that entails. I decided that as I was not getting any younger and having a reasonable level of ability I believed it was time to move on and try to find another interest. I joined a local fledgling bonsai club where most members thought that sticks in a pot was the best arrangement. How little did we know! I spent the next five years wondering what have I joined! I was confused about soils, styles, pots, pruning, re-potting, Akadama and Kiryu until I was introduced to a "Bonsai Artist", whatever that meant, called Peter Adams. What a revelation! Information also filtered down to the members with names which seemed like Gods from afar, Dan Barton, Peter Adams and then a little later Kevin Willson who was a magician with carving. Then from the Midlands came Steve Tolley with wonderfully presented trees. It would seem about this time large displays of trees were being shown which was an education to club members. The club, whose membership was getting larger, could maybe get one of the "Stars" to have a whole day called a workshop, it was wonderful.

Who was my teacher?

Peter Adams who lived in Farnham was a revelation. The ability to create wonderful living specimens was a gift from heaven and when I look back Peter was ahead of his time. His artwork was his signature. I attended many of his workshops and acquired a reasonable level of proficiency plus was able to enter some of my trees at local level shows. Further afield at Romsey I won Best tree in Show. I was thrilled that one of my trees was selected for the Birmingham Botanical Gardens Show organised by Steve Tolley. Time is my teacher and to try and have the ability to look and learn would be my mantra.

My choice of bonsai books

Without a doubt the books created by Peter Adams, which are sadly out of print, they tell you all you need to know of the creative process to produce a living entity. If you can find them in charity shops you won't be disappointed.

My favourite trees

When I started at the bonsai club many years ago I tried every species that existed in Christendom but over a period of time and careful selection I was pleased to work on just two varieties - Beech (*Fagus Sylvestris*) and Scots Pine (*Pinus Sylvestres*). Most of my trees are not too heavy - age takes its toll! I don't profess to be a bonsai artist, just a well-meaning amateur who appreciates all those creators of a living piece of art.

Have I experienced Bonsai abroad

I have been twice to the Trophy Show in Belgium where the standard and presentation was second to none, both most enjoyable and memorable occasions with opportunities to meet bonsai artists from across Europe.

My thoughts on Bonsai

I developed Parkinson's a few years ago and I am not looking for sympathy, just to explain to that superb Bonsai artist Steve Tolley that my wiring is not the best and would be better if I didn't have this affliction. On second thoughts, it's still pretty rough! I've had thirty years of friendship from numerous regular attendees who enjoying the atmosphere of creativity on show. One other member of the bonsai fraternity who is an artist in his own right is the wonderful Gordon Duffett. I've been privileged to own many of his incredibly accomplished bonsai pots. The glazes, shape, style of pot and size are just visually correct. With your new pot and the tree ready for a transformation the combination takes on a new dimension. An artisan of the highest order. No more needs to be said.

In Conclusion

Whilst I was writing this missive my thoughts reached out to those enthusiasts who sadly are no longer with us. In The main I enjoyed their company and contributions and overall improvement of our artistic hobby in the UK. I thankfully embraced the creative process which allows us to be part of nature. As the virus lessens we welcome a new beginning of endeavour and artistic inspiration for the future.

As a final thought

What a compelling hobby where people can fashion something beautiful as a living piece of art called a bonsai and not to be corralled into group thinking, just individual creativity.






